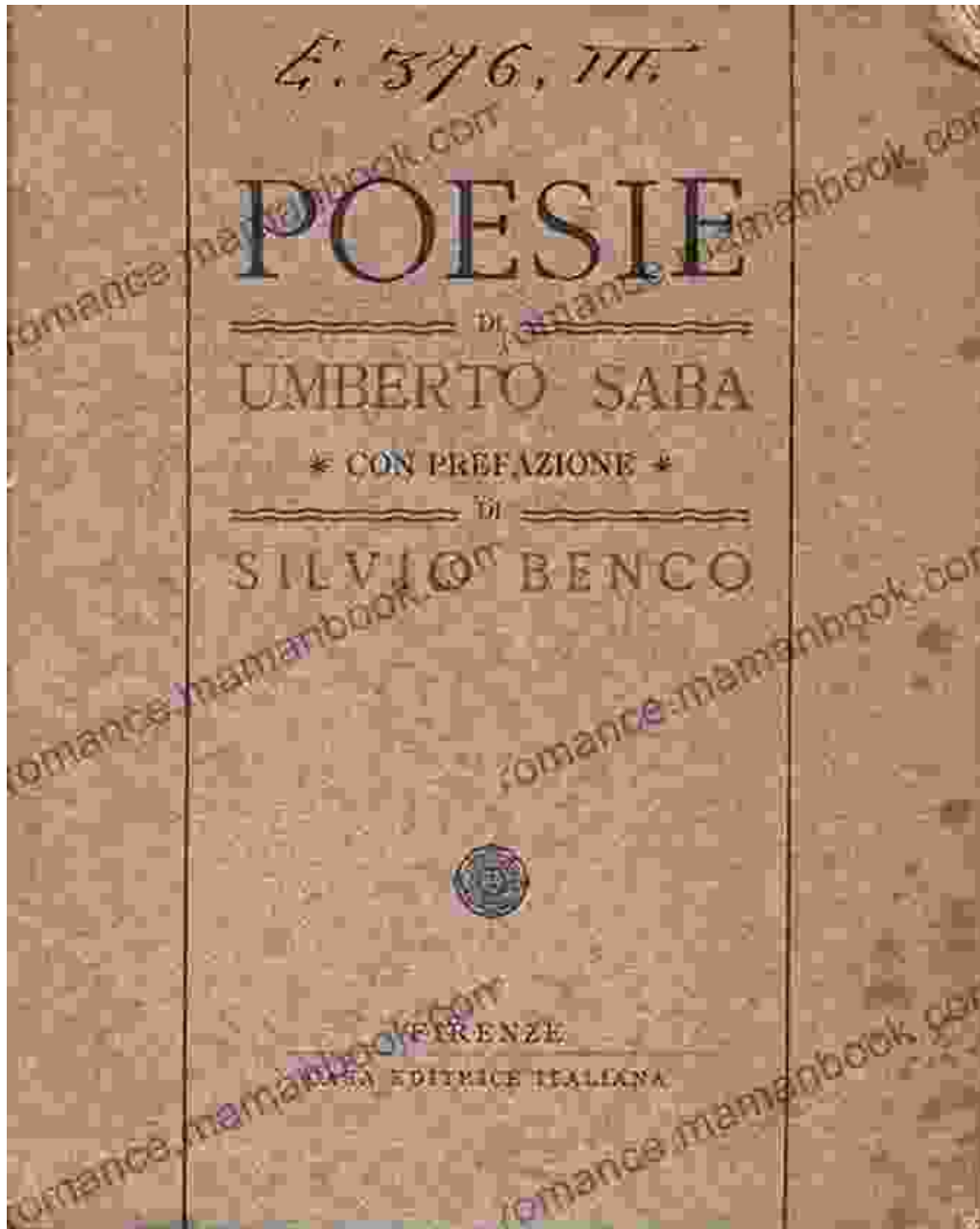

**Umberto Saba**

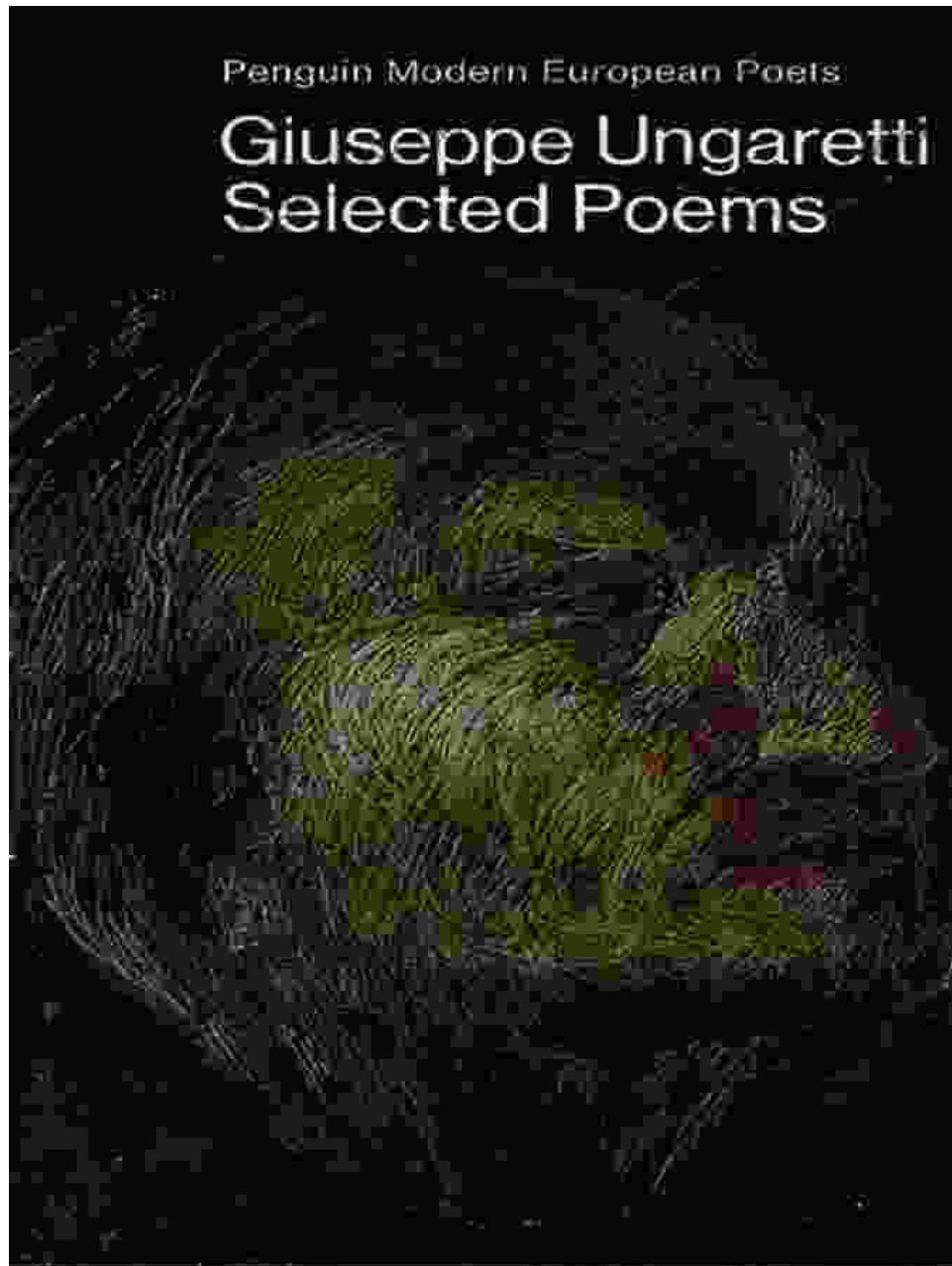
